



CASBHC identifies barriers to healthcare and **collaborates** to ensure youth get the care they need


CASBHC is a **leader** in screening children and adolescents

- Explore telehealth extension sites


#3 WORK TOWARD HEALTH EQUITY

- Increase awareness of and continue to address racial bias in the SBHC community
- Foster partnerships and learning opportunities to ensure SBHCs are responsive to the diverse needs of their community
- Create a more inclusive and equitable culture within CASBHC
- Address equity through advocacy

#4 STRENGTHEN RELATIONSHIPS BETWEEN SBHCS & SCHOOLS

- Demonstrate the value of SBHCs to educational mission
- Support SBHCs marketing and outreach efforts





#5 GROW ADVOCACY AND ENGAGEMENT OF YOUNG PEOPLE

- Establish a youth advisory board
- Commit to incorporating a youth perspective in CASBHC's work
- Engage youth in advocacy opportunities and request feedback on health and education initiatives

#6 IMPROVE INTERNAL OPERATIONS AND STRENGTHEN THE CULTURE OF COLLABORATION

- Strengthen relationships within the board of directors and between board and staff
- Strengthen and empower board committees
- Host an annual board/staff retreat
- Incorporate equitable policies and institute a health work culture

#7 DIVERSIFY CASBHC's FUNDING STREAMS

- Increase board involvement in fundraising
- Explore additional methods of generating earned revenue
- Grow individual giving and non-SBHC memberships
- Explore additional staffing or operational needs and fundraise for them

#8 ELEVATE CASBHC'S REPUTATION AND BRAND

- Evaluate CASBHC's brand awareness and reach
- Establish brand ambassadors and engage in high-level conversations building relationships with key decision-makers in Colorado



2021-2023 Strategic Outcomes

- #1 Existing field of SBHCs remains stable and is successful.
- #2 Communities interested in some level of SBHC engagement can achieve it.
- #3 SBHCs are seen as the model of equitable health care where trust is built. CASBHC is both the model and incubator of best practices.
- #4 Schools seek out and cultivate strong collaborations with SBHCs to achieve whole-student care.

2021-2023 Strategic Outcomes

- #5 Young people's voices inform CASBHC's work and advocacy.
- #6 CASBHC is a stronger organization with everyone contributing their best thinking and passion.
- #7 CASBHC's funding distribution is increasingly more diverse and there is a culture of fundraising at the organization.
- #8 CASBHC's brand and reputation are trusted and sought out at the highest levels.



HEALTH EQUITY STATEMENT

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Health equity is achieved when every person has the opportunity to "attain their full health potential" and no one is "disadvantaged from achieving this potential because of social position or other socially determined circumstances" (CDC). The health care system in Colorado, among other institutions in the state, has a long history of institutional racism and oppression established through policies and practices that persist even into the present day, all of

which result in inequitable health outcomes.

By **prioritizing the communities** that have been intentionally marginalized over time, school-based health centers (SBHCs) serve as an **intentional investment** in those communities, contributing to a change in systemic patterns and relationships. SBHCs **rebuild the community's trust** in the health care system and create space for youth to be advocates for their own health and success with inclusive, culturally responsive, and equitable environments as well as **transformational relationships**.

CASBHC exists to catalyze and support change among SBHCs to progress along the journey of health equity, acknowledging that it is a **lifelong journey**, while activating in our own sphere of influence to create change for more equitable policies and practices. We believe in the power of life experiences and in working to build trust with those who have long been marginalized and centering their voices in our work. We acknowledge the harm that institutions have produced and the power and privilege many of us continue to hold – and we work every day to change that. **We celebrate diversity and create inclusion while we work toward healing, liberation, and justice.**
